

Pupil Premium Expenditure Report

2020-2021

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools for children of statutory school age who are known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM) or children who have been eligible in the last six years. It is also for children who have been looked after by the local authority continuously for more than six months, and children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces. At Summerfield we recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals. We will allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support learners that we have identified as being disadvantaged. At Summerfield we are committed to ensuring that all children reach their full potential. This report summarises how we have used this funding in 2020/21 and the positive impact this has made to the children and their families.
